

## MINISTRY MOVEMENT

**W**orldCrafts, the fair-trade division of WMU, is partnering with Mully Children's Family (MCF) to help share the story of Dr. Charles Mully and expand WorldCrafts impact among impoverished artisan groups around the world. MCF, a nonprofit organization in Kenya that seeks to transform the lives of street children and youth living in poverty, was founded by Mully.

Mully was the first born in a family of eight, living in poverty in Kenya. At age 6, he was abandoned by his parents as they left in search of a better living. He grew up begging on the streets and became a Christian as a teenager.

When Mully was 17, he walked more than 40 miles to Nairobi to seek employment. He found work and met his future wife, Esther. He became a wealthy entrepreneur and respected community leader, and he and Esther had eight biological children.

In 1989, the Lord laid it on Mully's heart to help other children living in poverty in Africa. He sold all his property and businesses in order to provide street children in Africa with shelter, medical care, education, and more. Since then Charles and Esther Mully have taken guardianship of more than 12,000 abandoned children.

"We are delighted to be a part of sharing this life-changing story about how one man's obedience to God has transformed a nation," said Sandy Wisdom-Martin, executive director of national WMU. "Beyond a gripping storyline, watching this movie will inspire Southern Baptists to examine ways God is calling them to personally serve and minister to others."

Wisdom-Martin describes this project as a natural fit with WMU's vision of challenging Christian believers to understand and be radically involved in the mission of God and WMU's existing ministries.

"This partnership will bring more visibility and support for WorldCrafts' artisan groups in poverty and coming out of sex trafficking so we can minister to exponentially more artisans and their families," Wisdom-Martin said. "It will also underscore the Kingdom impact Christians can make through orphan care and adoption."

The movie will be shown October 3-5 on Oahu at the Dole Cannery Stadium 18, on Maui at the Maui Mall Megaplex, and on the Big Island at Makalapua Stadium 10 in Kailua-Kona and Prince Kuhio 9 in Hilo. ### SATURDAY—Help in Times of Disaster

## GET READY FOR KICKOFF!

**A great beginning can set the pace for a great year.** These eight tips are written to help plan your women’s ministry kickoff event. The ideas may also be tweaked to launch youth group, choir or other church ministry. Get ready for an awesome kickoff day!

**INVITE.** Invite. Invite. Don’t skip this step. Make a detailed plan for every female attendee of your church to receive both a printed and a verbal personal invitation. Build anticipation. Create a Facebook event. Send an e-invitation to members, asking them to forward it to friends. Publicize in your church publications, church website, and community newspaper.

**CONSIDER FIRST IMPRESSIONS.** Every detail counts today. Does your meeting space need fresh paint or updated art? Are restrooms and hallways spotless? Update directional signs. Create a quick registration process. Add fresh flowers, extra greeters and extra seating. Delegate preparation assignments, and involve new church members. “Whatever you do, do it from the heart, as something done for the Lord and not for people” Colossians 3:23.

**WORTH HER MINUTES!** Demonstrate that you value their time by planning every meeting well, beginning on kickoff day. Keep a relaxed atmosphere, but be purposeful with every minute. Begin and conclude precisely on time. Put long announcements in print. Overview the fall schedule and unveil new groups, plans and ministry projects. When the program is purposeful and top quality, they’ll come back and bring friends.

**MAKE IT SPECIAL.** Add some extra touch to make the kickoff memorable, such as a unique guest speaker, a brunch, a surprise decoration or gift. How about a funny ministry fashion show or scavenger hunt, a hands-on ministry project, a unique how-to demonstration? Make this an annual event no one will want to miss.

**ENCOURAGE FRIENDSHIPS.** Help women develop old and new Christian friendships. Wear nametags. Draw names for prayer partners or assign mentors. Understand that coffee break offers valuable conversation time. Introduce guests to new friends. Take someone to lunch. Plan a group picnic in the park. Ascertain that every attendee leaves with new friends.

**ADD ACTION.** Explain how your group plans to impact your community and your world for Christ. Your Bible study group—or quilting guild, mission organization, even exercise class—can add simple outreach ministry projects. Redirect your group’s focus from inward to upward and outward. Today’s women love to make a difference! Be “doers of the Word and not hearers only” James 1:22.

**POINT TO JESUS.** Never forget that Jesus is the focus. From kickoff day to year’s end, every action or spoken word must honor Him. Be joyful. Pray. Share your personal Jesus story. Play Christian music. Chat often about God’s blessings and power. Invite every newcomer to Sunday worship. Impact your community. This is no generic social group; this is a Christian women’s group!

**ASK FOR A COMMITMENT.** At the close of your kickoff event, ask women to register to join a group. Group leaders should call or email their class members before next week. Have signup sheets for snacks, retreats, projects, volunteer jobs, etc. Snap digital headshots for an online directory. Provide a printed list of fall dates, special projects or events, and church-wide events.

Oh, this is no ordinary day. A great opening day requires lots of prayer, planning and work, but when people come together to know and serve our Savior, it will be worth it all. Get ready to kick off!

# Budgeting 101

**In the course of the year**, whether a new ministry or one that has been established for many years, the issue of “BUDGET” comes up. Just the thought of the word, “budget” evokes many different emotions and can be an overwhelming experience for those involved.

Churches can take a new approach putting a budget together and use the time to glorify the Lord in how we show stewardship both on the individual level and corporately as a church body.

## WHAT IS A BUDGET?

There are many different definitions associated with the word. Here is a way to look at it — *A budget is a thoughtful analysis of limited resources to maximize effectiveness of serving God.*

Every individual and ministry has a limited amount of resources (or revenues) that they can use towards ministry related items (expenses) in meeting the mission of a church ministry.

How does a church develop a budget to maximize its effectiveness as a good steward of the resources been given?

First, evaluate the resources coming into the ministry. Most resources come through the giving of tithes and offerings. Evaluate giving historically and/or project future growth in giving.

Second, evaluate the expenses that you need to pay out during the year. You can break this into two major areas of expenses: operating and capital. Operating expenses are those expenditures that a church incurs to carry out the daily operations.

Capital expenses are those expenditures that are associated with buildings, equipment, vehicles, and any item that is not considered to be an **operational expenses**. Capital expenses are items that you expect to use for more than a year.

## WHAT IS A GOOD STARTING POINT IN DETERMINING OPERATING EXPENSES?

You can group together as many categories you feel for expenses for the budget. There

are three general categories to consider when putting an **operating expenses** together: Personnel costs, Program costs, and Administrative costs.




In determining your personnel costs, determine what salary and fringe benefits you will offer to the employees along with meeting any labor laws and tax requirements expenses.

In determining your program costs, take in consideration cooperative program giving (usually 5% -20% of undesignated giving), our three special missions offerings (Annie Armstrong Easter Offering, Lottie Moon Christmas Offering and The Sue Nishikawa Hawaii Pacific Missions Offering). Other items in your program costs would include but not limited to, Sunday School, youth programs, other missionary support, and any programs that a ministry be involved in (i.e., homeless or food ministries).

In determining your operating costs, you will need to take in consideration items like office supplies, different insurances, utilities.
