Building the Kingdom SMALL STEPS AT A TIME

As our churches have completed the Easter/ Resurrection Day season and are gearing up for the summer months, now is a great time to evaluate in preparation for the future. Evaluating the past four months of 2017 to effectively plan for 2018 can be a valuable tool for you and your church.

For many of us, days begin to run together, forming weeks that run together, forming months... you get the picture. Properly managing our time has become a ministry pitfall according to recent studies. Evaluation is often overlooked from our schedule due to the constant flow of emails, calls and other routine matters that make up our daily lives.

Evaluation is biblical. Jesus gives His honest evaluation of the seven churches in Revelation 2 and 3. To the church at Ephesus, for example, He states, "I know your works, your labor, and your endurance, and that you cannot tolerate evil. You have tested those who call themselves apostles and are not, and you have found them to be liars." In the same section, He also shares, "But I have this against you: You have abandoned the love you had at first. Remember then how far you have fallen; repent, and do the works you did at first. Otherwise, I will come to you and remove

your lampstand from its place—unless you repent."

Forgetting the evaluation process in a timely manner can leave holes in our memory that tend to complicate the future planning sessions and future ministry successes. Even a quick informal evaluation is valuable if time does not allow for a more detailed analysis. As you have captured times together in your church, such as New Year's celebrations, community outreaches, worship times and more, take the time to survey your staff teams, membership and even visitors to glean their impressions, thoughts and valuable input.

Many resources are available regarding time management including more thoughts on evaluation. Your Hawaii Pacific Baptist Convention team is constantly poring over resources, websites and a large variety of materials with the desire of being able to provide effective ministry tools for you. In March, we spent several days meeting with our Oahu church leaders in five different sessions. In April, we had two sessions on the Big Island, and hope to have another in Maui soon. Chris and I were often surprised by the amount of people that came to the

dialogues, and the excellent responses we got.

I know that some of you are not like me. I love new technology, new songs and new strategies. Some of you when you hear the word change, it makes you want to stick your fingers in your ears and shout "la la la la, I can't hear you!" But change is not something we as Christians should be afraid of. If we are honest, we are meant to be change agents in the world. Working to bring about change from death to life in Christ, and redeeming a broken world with his message. The Jerusalem believers in Acts 15 we're resisting change, but it took strong bold leadership to point the body in the way God was moving.

Now, to be clear, we are not presenting any doctrinal changes to HPBC, but we do have new strategies that we see God using in the years to come. We don't want HPBC to be seen as an organization that solely runs events that we email you about and expect you to come to. We want be known for taking the initiative to come to our churches asking, "What is God doing in your ministry?" and "How might we be able to assist, resource, support and pray for you?" Yes, we also presented changes that some staff that are retiring this summer at our sessions, but bigger than who or how we will replace them, are the changes you should expect from our current and future staff in how they interact with you.

We hope to have another round of session maybe in August or September. So keep your ear up to listen for when those dates become firm, and be fearless agents of change for God's kingdom wherever he places you.

Teaching to Transform

Moving a class from information to transformation

hen teaching the Bible, are you teaching for information or transformation? Do you teach by lecturing only? Is your teaching style the way your class learns best? What will bring life change in your Bible study? These are a few questions that were asked and addressed at an adult Sunday School teacher training session for Calvary, Tamuning and Lighthouse Baptist churches in Guam in April 2017. The teachers and pastors who attended learned a few tips and techniques that will help move the class from information to transformation.

Ed Perez, pastor of Tamuning Christian Fellowship shared, "As teachers, we have a tendency to talk and talk. We must question whether the point is getting across through lecturing. We looked at the effectiveness of Jesus different teaching styles. Of course, the ultimate point of all our Bible teachings is the lesson is God teaching us. We must always go back to His Word and His truth and that must always be primary."

The training stressed that the Bible is the text, not the curriculum. The lesson must

focus on the biblical text. The training also focused on motivation, examination and application. Do a fun, motivational object lesson or something like it to grab their attention but relates to the lesson. Examination must look at what the Bible says about the lesson. Further examination must be referenced with other scripture and not opinion. The class should close with application. It's a challenge to live out the lesson during the week. Unfortunately, many teachers do not issue an application. Application and follow up develops transformation. Without application, they become hearers of the word only.

The different groups then chose a more popular Bible story and had to present it to the other groups in a creative way. One group chose the story of Lazarus and presented it as a drama. The sense of sight, sound, and smell were heightened during the drama.

The session closed with 2 Timothy 2:2, "And what you have heard from me in the presence of many witnesses, commit to faithful men who will be able to teach others also."



WHY We Need to PLANT NEW CHURCHES

EXPANDING GOD'S KINGDOM

his question is one of the main questions being asked around the nation, not only in Southern Baptist circles, but seemingly in every major evangelical denomination. Some see church planting as a threat to existing churches, while others see it as a waste of resources. From my point of view, I would like to share two thoughts that drive my ministry.

First of all, church planting drives the congregation toward the journey of divine exploration. This can be a new journey to the congregation because they have never ventured into reproducing themselves. It is divine because Jesus guides every step of the way. Jesus said, "I am with you always, even to the end of the age" (Matthew 28:20 NASB).

Most of our churches are small and some are struggling to survive financially. But several of our churches have volunteered to become a sponsoring church for a new church plant. Often, the church could not afford to give much, but gave what they could. Along with the sponsoring church, the church plant starts to grow. When the sponsoring pastor helps the new church plant, his congregation sees the need. They will often pray and serve in outreach efforts and ministries along with the planter.

Second, the blessing of planting new works helps churches see the Great Commission in action. Currently in the HPBC, there are 12 sponsoring churches supporting 16 church plants. The reports from October





through December of 2016 indicated that these church plants made 1,646 visits, sent 1,874 emails or letters, invited 1,468 people to their churches and homes, and 2,732 people to their outreach events. They made one-on-one Gospel presentations to 142 individuals and group presentations to 327 people. There were 110 professions of faith and 13 baptisms.

The work to expand God's Kingdom begins with our HPBC churches being willing to partner together. The task is urgent and the possibilities are enormous. The population across the Pacific Islands, according to current estimates, is at over 4 million people. Considering that the HPBC has 149 congregations, the ratio of HPBC churches to individuals stands at one church for every 26,666 people. But remember that Jesus said, "I am with you always."

Pray that more churches will hear the Macedonian Call and sponsor a new mission. Pray that individuals will seek God and hear His call to minister to the lost. Pray that people will hear God's message and receive Him as their Personal Savior.


