



Pastors from Kauai, Oahu, and the Big Island participated. The name of our HPBC conference center, Pu'u Kahea, is a Hawaiian word that can be translated "Hill of Calling." We thank God for providing a wonderful time for men

who are living out their calling as pastors. Your Hawaii Pacific Baptist Convention sponsored this event. It was funded by your church's gifts to the



Hawaii Volcano Blasts Churches Into Action

PAHOA, Hawaii (BP) -- Amid a lava flow that has destroyed three dozen structures and the threat of a violent volcanic eruption, Hawaii's churches "are working in really neat ways," said Chris Martin, executive director of the Hawaii Pacific Baptist Convention (HPBC).

Hawaii's Kilauea volcano has destroyed 36 structures, including 26 houses, since it began releasing lava through vents May 3.

Congregations on Hawaii's Big Island have banded together to pray, secure housing for some of the area's 2,000 evacuees and, beginning next week, operate a mobile shower unit.

"The main focus of our people so far,"
Martin told Baptist Press, has been
ministry "to the needs that are immediate.
But our history and our practice has been
a long-term presence with those that have
been affected by disasters."

"Stepping in to meet needs," Martin added, will "open great doors" for Gospel witness.

Since May 3, the Kilauea volcano has been releasing lava through vents in the ground, destroying 36 structures, including 26 homes, the Associated Press reported. Some 60,000 gallons of flammable liquids had to be removed from a geothermal power plant near the vents, according to CBS News.

Geologists warn that within a week, the largest eruption of Kilauea in a century could spew ash and refrigerator-sized boulders five miles high and scatter them across a three-mile radius.

"If it goes up, it will come down," U.S. Geological Survey volcano hazards coordinator Charles Mandeville said, according to AP. "You don't want to be underneath anything that weighs 10 tons when it's coming out at 120 mph."

At Puna Baptist Church in Pahoa, Hawaii, 10 member families have had to evacuate their homes and two of those homes have been destroyed by lava, associate pastor Rob Thommarson told BP.

"What we've done immediately is try to help all the families get into some

immediate emergency housing," said Thommarson, himself among the evacuees. "Everybody is staying with family, friends and church members."

If the evacuation "continues for weeks or months," Thommarson said, Puna will attempt to move its evacuated members into "intermediate housing" with more privacy.

The local Big Island Baptist Association's mobile shower unit has been moved onto Puna's parking lot and likely will begin serving residents early next week, said Thommarson, a retired International Mission Board missionary. A prayer tent nearby will

be manned by volunteers available to pray with evacuees.

Local churches of various denominations will band together to provide evacuees with food and clothing, Thommarson noted. A community prayer meeting is scheduled for Friday evening.

Neither Puna nor nearby Paradise Park Baptist Church have had their facilities threatened by lava, Martin said.

"Several" pastors and other church members in the area, Martin said, "have been using their vehicles to help people move" their belongings from harm's way.

HPBC disaster relief units are on standby, Martin said, and working with local officials to determine when and how they can best help.

Both Martin and Thommarson requested prayer from believers across the country as the lava flow continues.

41 YEARS LATER

Four Suggestions for Putting a SALARY COMPENSATION PACKAGE Together for a Pastor

Each year a congregation and/or leadership is called upon to develop a framework on determining what is the best course of action in compensating current pastoral leadership or hiring a new pastor who is starting. Listed below are four general categories to consider in putting together a salary composition package:

Base Salary

The base salary should include items based upon objective criteria for the position. As a church, you should determine to answer the question: "What are the qualifying factors associated with the position?" Most job descriptions are categorized in three main areas know as KSAs (Knowledge requirements, Skills, Abilities). These should be determined by the position requirements and not on the individual themselves. Some areas to consider are: educational requirements (i.e. are you expecting the individual to have a bachelor's or master's degree), experience in ministry, and professional certifications. Other areas include the ability to communicate, personal and professional interaction both inside and outside the ministry, and leadership skills. Another factor to consider is the size and scope of the ministries involved. Another question to answer is whether this is a full-time (40-50 hours a week) or part-time position. Will the individual be allowed to have other jobs or contract work that will provide other income. Finaly, when determining compensation, you should take into consideration the local cost of living and what other professionals in your area are paid with similar education, experience, and abilities.



Fringe Benefits

It is important to understand any labor laws that may impact fringe benefits. In Hawaii, the Prepaid Health Act of 1974 states that any employee that works four consecutive weeks of 20 hours is entitled to Medical Benefits. Also take in consideration items associated with flex spending plans, educational costs, SECA offset to name a few.



Retirement Plan

A minister must be more proactive in preparing for their own future. We have partnered with GuideStone Financial Resources to help provide guidance in retirement benefits. A church that is actively contributing to cooperative program and to a minister's annuity, can receive matching funds from both the convention and GuideStone. If you need any resources on this, please feel free to contact GuideStone or the convention offices. In addition to the annuity, GuideStone can work with individual churches to set up a 403(b) plan for payroll deductions so a minister can tax defer his income.



Accountable Reimbursement Plans

The Tax Cut and Jobs Act of 2017 had a significant impact on reimbursement plans for a church in 2018. In 2018, all unreimbursed employee expenses will not be allowed as a tax-deductible expense. Churches that currently have a Nonaccountable Reimbursement Plan in place might evaluate the tax impact on a minister. For example, if a church has an auto allowance under the nonaccountable reimbursement plan, they may receive the auto allowance as part of their paycheck and pay taxes on it but also get the deduction for unreimbursed employee miles. However, with the new tax law, that that deduction will not be allowed in 2018. A consideration is to have an accountable reimbursement plan and turn in a mileage log for reimbursement and the reimbursement would not be taxable income to the minister.

These four areas of consideration lay the framework on putting a salary composition package for a pastor. As always, it is good to consult an HR expert or tax professional in understanding the taxable/non-taxable parts of the salary composition. 






Yokohama International Baptist Church 横浜国際パプテスト教会

Our Executive Director, Chris Martin, has been working with Dr. Craig Blaising at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary (SWBTS) to provide **affordable theological education for Hawaii pastors, staff, and other church leaders**. They are offering special pricing for their 36 hour Masters of Theological Studies (MTS). This degree could later be applied to completing the full Master of Divinity (MDiv).

If you apply, are accepted for Fall 2018, enroll, and take classes for Fall 2018, you can lock in your tuition rate at \$100 per hour for the duration of their MTS degree (\$300 per 3 hour class)—however long that takes—provided you stay in continuous enrollment Fall and Spring (summer would be optional) until the degree is completed. If you drop out for a semester, the rate upon readmission would be the normal tuition. They will also waive the 2018, \$300 semester fee. Note: Those who begin in 2019 will be at the normal tuition rate. We highly encourage you to APPLY NOW.
