Your struggle with uncertainty is resolved in your confidence in His guidance. Your withdrawal into a tighter circle is released in your understanding that He is working through many others for your benefit. God is always faithful, and His Kingdom's work is unfolding in front of us. Let us rise together to see Him do more significant things through us now than ever before. God is empowering us for these days and greater days ahead. His Kingdom



During the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, the Body of Christ has come together in ways that were unplanned. Pastors and church leaders took the challenge to bring their congregations together online. Churches gathered each week in unity to encourage and pray together, strengthen their leadership, and navigated through the unknowns. And, the Lord has been faithful.

- Ask the Lord to strengthen pastors and church leaders. Ask God to grant wisdom, discernment, courage, and strength as they proclaim the Gospel, lead the congregation, and provide creative care.
- Ask the Lord to bring a sense of unity among our network of churches as we work together for the Kingdom of God.
- Ask the Lord to bring a heart for missions within our neighborhood and community.
- For each region/island, ask the Lord to bring creative and innovative ways to reach people with the Gospel of Jesus Christ.



The Big Island is home to approximately 187,000 people where twenty Hawaii Pacific Baptist churches serve the island that has the largest landmass among the Hawaiian Islands.

The Big Island Baptist Association cooperates for student ministries, missions, church planting, college ministry, and fellowship.

- Pray for pastors as they work together for outreach and mutual support. Ask the Lord to help seasoned pastors and leaders to encourage younger pastors and churches.
- Pray for leaders as they forge a new partnership with International Mission Board (IMB) personnel in Japan.



Combined Maui, Lanai, and Molokai have a population of 155,000 with eleven HPBC churches serving these islands. The pandemic has hit Maui County especially hard economically.

- Ask the Lord to relieve the suffering from the high unemployment on Maui due to the pandemic.
- Ask the Lord to help Maui County pastors and leaders as they continue to meet monthly for prayer and fellowship.



Oahu with a population of over 950,000 is known as a melting pot with its mixture of cultures and religions. Eighty Hawaii Pacific Baptist churches and missions reach diverse communities.

- Ask the Lord to open the eyes of those who are searching for God.
- Ask the Lord to guide believers to see their island as a mission field.



Kauai is home to one of the wettest spots on earth and home to approximately 73,000 people. Four Hawaii Pacific Baptist churches serve the Garden Island.

- Ask the Lord to draw people to Himself.
- Ask the Lord to move in the communities and to direct the churches as they work together.



There are 11 HPBC churches in Okinawa, Yokohama, Tokyo, and Himeji, Japan, as well as Seoul and Pyongtaek, South Korea, Bangkok, Thailand, and Manila, Philippines.

Many of the churches of our Asia Baptist Network (ABN) were founded through efforts of the International Mission Board (IMB), but are now self-supporting Hawaii Pacific Baptist churches. Their work continues to reach more of East Asia and Southeast Asia in church planting and missions, as well as serving alongside the other churches of the Hawaii Pacific Baptist Convention.

 Pray for the pastors and church leaders of ABN churches as they find creative ways to reach their communities for Christ during the pandemic



Hawaii Pacific Baptist work in Micronesia (over 600 islands) is primarily in Guam with vibrant multi-cultural churches. The association has worked closely together for evangelism and outreach.

- Ask the Lord to strengthen the churches of Guam and throughout Micronesia.
- Ask the Lord to both revitalize existing congregations and grow new congregations.



The South Pacific Baptist Association includes 10 churches in Samoa and American Samoa. While most of the churches are primarily Samoan, there are also Korean and Chinese language congregations.

- Pray for the Pastor Training School which meets at Samoa Baptist Academy.
- Pray for Samoa Baptist Churches as the island remains on a Covid-19 island travel ban.

### Rembering ARNOLD GOTO

### Hawaii Baptist Foundation President

Arnold Goto, President of our Hawaii Baptist Foundation, passed away Monday, August 3, 2020.

Arnold enthusiastically served as the President of the Hawaii Baptist Foundation for almost five years, following his faithful service of eight years on its Board of Directors as Chairman of the Board's Development Committee. Hawaii Pacific Baptists have benefited greatly from his dependable service through the Foundation over many years.

Under his leadership, the number of churches participating in investment and planned giving services has increased substantially. It also resulted in a strengthening of the investments for the Hawaii Baptist Academy and the Hawaii Pacific Baptist Convention.

Paul Oyer, former Foundation President and member at Olivet Baptist said, "Arnold was the strongest possible candidate to assume leadership of the Hawaii Baptist Foundation when he did. I was able to leave the Foundation with confidence in its future under his leadership."

Arnold's compassion for others, love for life, and commitment to the Gospel strengthened the lives of everyone he knew. Countless pastors, church leaders, and colleagues have remarked on his generosity, hospitality, and God-given ability to encourage others toward Christ.

Oyer also remarked, "Arnold quickly gained the friendship and respect of his counterparts at the other Baptist state foundations throughout the country."

Arnold served as executive pastor and elder chair at Hawaii Kai Church from January 2009 to December 2015 including 4 years while the church was without a senior pastor. He served alongside a team of elders as they recruited pastoral assistance from across the Southern Baptist Convention, inviting seasoned pastors, professors, and respected denominational leaders to fill the pulpit and provide solid teaching for the congregation. He remained as executive pastor and continued as elder chair





when Pastor Dan Wong became senior pastor and they served together. Dan said about Arnold, "Like his Savior, Arnold Goto loved and served the church at great cost to himself."

Before these ministry roles, Arnold had a successful career as an engineer and business executive with various leading companies. This included being a National Partner with KPMG International, leading his own business consulting firm, serving as managing director at BearingPoint, INC in Los Angeles, the managing director at Oracle in Hawaii, and as a sales representative at Hewlett Packard in Silicon Valley and Hawaii. Arnold was also an FAA-certified Private Pilot and a Registered Professional Engineer.

Arnold is survived by his wife, Cyndy, and their sons Jonathan and Joshua.



# Future Missionaries Work Through Deepen Discipleship Resource

ive college students from three churches have
 committed to doing a Bible study that will prepare
 them to serve overseas next summer.

For one or two months, these college students will live on their own in Tokyo, while working closely with an International Mission Board (IMB) team on the field to "get their feet wet" in overseas missions.

The curriculum they are using is an IMB resource called "Deepen Discipleship" which is used to prepare new personnel prior to being sent overseas. It is a 25-week study with 5 days' worth of content per week.

Each day's study walks you through a reading from the New Testament, a meditation on verses on Scripture, and key questions for self-reflection. There are also activities to help apply the reading and to evaluate your relationship with God as you go through the study.

The course is designed to view Scripture through a missional lens with a group of believers to grow closer in discipleship with Jesus.

So far, the college students have expressed enjoying the challenge of not only being in the Word every day but having the opportunity to sit down with God and evaluate their heart based on what they have just read.

"Each week when we gather together, we pray for each other, for our time, and for Japan. We openly talk about what activities challenged us, topics that were encouraging or were difficult to understand in the past week's reading, and how we saw God move in our lives as a reflection of our time in the Word. We also talk about how God is using the time to grow us closer to Him as He forms us as a team to be ready to serve overseas together. I love getting the front-row view of God's work in their lives as He also refines my heart through this study."

Natalie is an IMB Journeyman delayed from her deployment because of pandemic travel restrictions. The IMB Journeyman program is supported by your gifts through the Cooperative Program and through the Lottie

# CHURCHES WORK TOGETHER with Harvest Family Life Ministry

Harvest Family Life Ministry to Serve Families with

Foster Children

arvest Family Life Ministry of Hawaii (HFLM) is working to build partnerships with churches and businesses in order to minister to families with foster children.

One of the big ministry outreach projects HFLM conducts each year is to gather school supplies and backpacks for foster children and other keiki (children) in need. Several of Hawaii Pacific Baptist churches have been involved with this vital ministry over the years.

For the backpack ministry, Central Baptist Church, Oahu provided volunteers and worked to help gather the supplies. First Baptist Church (FBC) Wahiawa provided supplies, volunteers, and space at the church's property to be used to gather and pack the supplies. Churches and social agencies throughout Hawaii served to help channel the backpacks to the kids.

Over 300 loaded backpacks were delivered on Oahu, 50 were shipped to Maui and 111 were delivered to Molokai through Kaunakakai Baptist.

FUKUOKA, Japan (Baptist Press) — When IMB worker Jack Wattanawongsawang and his wife, Prinna, moved to Fukuoka, Japan, at the end of 2016, one of the first things they began to do was prayer walk.

They'd leave their apartment, pick a direction, and just start walking. Along the way, they'd pray for God to lead them to the people He had prepared for them to meet, and for God to direct them to the places He'd prepared for them to go.

And then, they'd pray one more thing. They'd pray specifically for God to open a door for them to share the Gospel with an entire family, and for that whole family to put their faith in Christ.

After years of ministry in Japan, a country where less than half a percent of the population are evangelical Christians, they'd learned that social persecution was a challenging barrier to the Gospel.

"There's a saying in Japan that the nail that sticks out gets hammered down," Jack said. "Becoming a Christian is that. You become a nail that sticks out from your family and from society. So, you get hammered down. That makes it really hard to accept Christ alone."

This past March, the couple celebrated God's answer to four years of prayer as they watched Hatsuko\* and her granddaughter Momoka\* profess their faith in Christ publicly through baptism. The new believers were far from alone. They were following in the steps of the rest of their family who had all put their faith in Christ over the last several years.

"This is truly a God story that no one could have planned," said Prinna. "Our whole church family was filled with joy."

God first began working in the life of Momoka's brother, who met a Christian when he was in college. That believer led him to faith in Christ and helped him understand the Bible, but after graduation, they lost touch.

Prinna and Jack met the family because Momoka's mother, Yuko\*, began attending a cooking class they were teaching at a community center not far from their house. They'd found the community center during a prayer walk when the mission pastor from their sending church, Silverdale Baptist Church in Chattanooga, Tenn., came to visit soon after they moved.

They began partnering with a local church plant to use the cooking class to build friendships and share the Gospel. Jack invited the pastor from the church plant to attend the class, and he did.

When the pastor met Yuko, she told him her son was a Christian because of a friend he'd made in college, and she'd always wished she could

meet that friend. It took just a few more minutes of conversation for them to both realize that the pastor was that friend — he'd introduced <u>her son to Christ</u>, and then years later planted a church in Fukuoka.

Prinna invited Yuko to the church, and Yuko and her husband both began attending with their son. As believers invested in them and encouraged them to study the Bible, the Holy Spirit began to work on their hearts. Four months after they first visited the church plant, Yuko and her husband both accepted Christ. The pastor baptized them in the ocean last August.

Momoka was skeptical of her parents' new faith at first. But it was hard to ignore how much gentler and kinder her father had become. He even told her he loved her, something he had rarely done before.

The pastor began coming over to Yuko's house to study the Bible with Yuko and Momoka. That's when Hatsuko first began to understand the Gospel. She would listen to the Bible studies because she lived with her daughter's family.

God used Scripture and the love of local believers to show Momoka and Hatsuko He cared for them, and He was worth surrendering to. Their baptisms this past March were celebrations of more than just their salvation alone. They were celebrations of God's amazing grace to draw a whole family to Himself through the faithful witness of a local church.

"How much we believe God can do is the key. Do we really believe He can save people?" Jack said. "He said He will do it, and He will. Are we begging Him that He would lead us to see His plan and connect the dots and see all that He has prepared?"

When Jack and Prinna first began prayer-walking four years ago, it was often just the two of them. They had no idea how God would answer their prayers.

Today, they still prayer-walk through Fukuoka, but they're not alone anymore. They walk alongside the church God led them to partner with, which now includes three generations of a family who are a constant reminder to them that He is always at work.

"Lead us to the people that you have prepared for us. Lead us to people who will be saved and become our family. Open the door for us to share the Gospel. Save whole families, save whole communities. That's always our prayer," Jack said.
