Hawaii Pacific Stays Virtual for Second Year

The Hawaii Pacific Baptist Convention met virtually November 4-5 on Zoom and Facebook Live for its 79th Annual Meeting because of ongoing COVID restrictions impacting its widely-scattered region.

Its theme, *Rising Together*, was taken from Colossians 3:1.

"Despite the geographic expanse of the Hawaii Pacific Baptist Convention [which spreads out on either side of the International Date Line], our churches have embraced a close-knit commitment to working together to be leaders in impacting God's kingdom throughout the Pacific and Asia," Executive Director Chris Martin told Baptist Press.

The HPBC is poised to enter into strategic partnerships with multiple state conventions, Martin said.

Business consisted of 205 messengers from at least 50 of HPBC's 161 churches and church plants passing a \$1,796,300 budget for 2022, which is a 24 percent increase from the 2021 budget.

Cooperative Program giving from churches is anticipated to be \$1,200,000, plus \$130,000 from the Sue Nishikawa State Missions Offering and \$175,000 from the North American Mission Board. Again this year, 20 percent of CP funds — \$240,000 — is allocated for national and international Southern Baptist missions and ministries.

"We are excited that the churches of the Hawaii Pacific Baptist Convention not only receive support through the Cooperative Program, but they are also positioned to make a difference through their gifts through CP," Martin said. "We highly value the relationships across the SBC network, especially in efforts to provide contextualized ministry that will advance God's kingdom throughout our incredible convention of churches."

Officers elected at the interactive virtual annual meeting are: President Shane Okimoto, pastor of Waiakea Baptist Bible Church in Hilo; First Vice President Johnny Hom, associate pastor of Nu'uanu Baptist Church on the island of Oahu; Second Vice President Brian Frable, pastor of Kona Baptist Church on Hawaii Island; and recording secretary Grace Poei, a member of University Avenue Baptist Church on the island of Oahu.

In his report to messengers, Martin spoke of three initiative areas - theological, leadership, and missional development - for HPBC churches.

"Your Cooperative Program dollars will fuel the growth of local ministry leaders, the mobilization of local missionaries and the placement of local ministries," he said. "We will pour into the coming generations to empower pastors, leaders, missionaries, seminary students, lay leadership and more to advance the

churches and ministries of every Hawaii Pacific Baptist church."

A regularly set virtual Pastors Forum, which includes pastors from the Hawaiian Islands, Guam, Samoa, Bangkok (Thailand), Manila (Philippines), Japan, and South Korea, was designed to "uphold and sustain a stronger kingdom network of like-minded churches and ministry partners to facilitate God's kingdom through Hawaii Pacific Baptists," reported Craig Webb assistant executive director for assist.

Mission projects are being developed for the Philippines, Korea, Japan and New Zealand, plus a vision trip to Taiwan. "We are also working with partners on a strategy for HPBC churches to impact New Zealand," said Brian Smart, assistant executive director for advance.

Work on rebranding and a new logo for the regional convention are now in use.

At least 100 college students are involved in collegiate ministries on Oahu and Big Island, according to Arjay Gruspe. At least 70 join in Bible study or discipleship, about a dozen in leadership development, and 18 churches are being assisted by collegiate ministries.

The 80th annual meeting is set for Nov. 3-4, 2022, in the Hibiscus Ballroom and Foyer of the Ala Moana Hotel in Honolulu.

The event consisted of a worship time, testimonies by women who have experienced God in the midst of the pandemic, and a message by Kelly King, Women's Ministry Specialist for Lifeway Christian Resources. Kelly's message was focused around God calling women to be shepherds. When women are encouraged by God's Word and presence, they are infused with courage from above, to embrace God's word by allowing it to transform them from the inside out, and to echo by pouring out the goodness and truths of God's Word.

The in person gatherings took place at hosting church sites on Oahu, Maui, and Hawaii Island. Thank you to Mililani, University Avenue, and Waialae Baptist Church on Oahu, to Valley Isle Fellowship on Maui, and to Waikoloa and Hamakua Baptist Church on Hawaii Island for opening up your church campuses to the women and for welcoming our leadership team and the women who participated.

The Asia Baptist Network ladies also gathered via Zoom. With the assistance of the entire ministry team including Haruko Strydom from Japan and Rose Waligora in Korea, 80 ladies gathered and connected more intimately via breakout rooms. Women from Japan, Philippines, Korea, and Guam joined in. What a beautiful reminder that God brings us all together through technology until we are able to travel once again.

A special thank you to Haruko for translating all the communication to Japanese to help us reach many of our Japanese speaking ladies.

On behalf of the women's retreat team, we are so grateful for all the ladies who participated in-person or online in these gatherings. The purpose of HPBC Women's Ministry is to encourage and challenge women to focus on their personal spiritual growth and journey with God. An abundant life with Christ begins with an intimate relationship with Christ.

From there, leadership development follows as we share God's Word and come alongside others through discipleship.

The team looks forward to what the Lord has in store for HPBC Women in 2022.




Kinoole Baptist Church Celebrates 75 Years of Ministry in Hilo

Ministry Started for Autistic Children at Agape Mission Baptist

According to the CDC approximately 1 in 54 children in the U.S. is diagnosed with Autism or Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). This disorder is a developmental disability that affects all ethnic and socioeconomic families, including the Kim family.

Calvin Kim who serves as Senior Pastor of Agape Mission Baptist Church (Palolo, Oahu) and his wife Bin, understand the challenges of raising an autistic child firsthand. Their four-year-old daughter, Chloe, was diagnosed with ASD in September of 2019.

Rather than keeping their challenges private, the Kims saw a ministry opportunity with their church to help their daughter and other children battling ASD. It is their belief that autistic children also need to learn about the Lord. So in October 2021 they hired a Registered Behavioral Technician and gathered

volunteers to start a Sunday School class for autistic children (ages 4-8).

Each child receives one-on-one attention in class from skilled volunteers while they participate in worship, Bible study, crafts, and art. This weekly ministry provided by Agape Church meets a unique and vital need on Oahu. Agape Mission is a Korean congregation, yet their Sunday services are offered in English as well. This church welcomes all families and is also seeking volunteers to assist with their autism ministry.

In 2021, your HPBC Executive Board researched, developed, and approved new initiatives to strengthen Hawaii Pacific Baptist Churches in theological, leadership, and missional development. With your HPBC staff team alongside, you can explore and utilize these opportunities, beginning January 1, 2022.

Your Cooperative Program gifts will fund these initiatives supplemented by additional resources through your contributions to the Sue Nishikawa Offering for Hawaii Pacific Missions. The HPBC Programs Committee will oversee the process of application, approval, and evaluation to strengthen accountability and integrity for our cooperative work.

As funds from the North American Mission Board (NAMB) will provide for evangelistic ministries, we will focus HPBC resources on these three areas:

Theological Development Initiatives

In the area of theological development, your executive board developed student support pathways for the six SBC seminaries through on-campus, on-island, and online courses, with other seminary engagements for alumni and students. These pathways provide essential resources to call out those God calls to serve and equip them for the ministries He has prepared.

Deepening our relationships with all the SBC seminaries enhances your efforts in recruiting and developing the coming generations of pastors, missionaries, and ministry leaders. More opportunities spring from these relationships that will strengthen your service and your church's ministry for the coming years.

Missional Development Initiatives

Your church can empower and mobilize more members for gospel engagement locally and globally through missional development initiatives than ever before. Scholarships and subsidies, provided through Cooperative Program gifts, enable pastors and mission leaders to participate in mission trips or lead church teams to engage a new mission field. These initiatives will expand your missional reach to engage fresh mission efforts, whether at home or across the globe.

For pastors that have never led teams from their church or for ministers that lack engagement in the field for many years, these opportunities bring training, practical assistance, and financial support to bring a new missional vision into reach.
